From Tyler's Desk:

Why Does It Rain?

"For as the rain and the snow come down from heaven and do not return there but water the earth, making it bring forth and sprout, giving seed to the sower and bread to the eater, so shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose." — Isaiah 55:10-11

This fall has turned out to be one of the wettest falls in recent years. It seems its raining almost every other day. But even in all this rain, we understand the blessings we receive from it. God sends us rain for a purpose. The rain waters the earth, which in turn causes plants to grow, giving an abundance of food. If rain didn't accomplish this purpose, rain would just be... wet.

In I Kings 19, Elijah had reached a discouraging point in his life. He felt like he was all alone in his suffering. He traveled a day's journey into the wilderness, and prayed to God to take away his life.

God answered Elijah's prayer, but not in the way Elijah had asked. Instead of taking away his life, God gave Elijah food and drink. Elijah ate and drank, but then laid down again to die.

Apparently, Elijah did not understand why he had received this blessing from God. Therefore God sent an angel a second time, and gave Elijah more food and drink. This time the angel commanded Elijah "Eat and drink, for the journey is to great for you." This second time, Elijah consumed his meal, and used the strength from that meal to travel to Horeb, which was known as the "mountain of God."

Just as God sends rain for a purpose, God gives us strength for a purpose. When God feeds and refreshes our souls, he does so to renew our strength, so we can proclaim his glory. Use the God given strength you have to carry out God's service.

Lessons from an Ant Mound

Have you ever watched an ant colony at work? The complex tasks that the colony is able to perform while working together surely holds lessons worthy for our consideration. Solomon wrote by inspiration, "Go to the ant, thou sluggard and consider her ways" (Prov. 6:6). Let us take his inspired directive and consider a few of the things ants can teach us.

An Ant Will Work for Its Colony/Family

Ants move tirelessly, carrying loads far larger than themselves in order to provide for the family. How do we measure up? We must follow the ant's example in providing for our families (ITim. 5:8). Also,

there is the responsibility for the Christian to carry his load in the spiritual family (Phil. 2:2-5; I Cor. 15:58).

An Ant Is Not Too Prideful to Do the Grunt Work

Could you imagine watching a line of ants scurrying to a recently killed beetle, each one dutifully taking his portion and returning it to the colony, only to have one step out of line and turn his nose up at the beetle? "I don't transport beetle," we might imagine him saying, "that is below me." No, ants get it right when it comes to doing the grunt work, it is the humans that sometimes need a little help. Pride is the great enemy of a Christian who desires to do the work of the Lord (Prov. 16:18). The solution is to remember for whom we work: the Lord (Col. 3:23).

An Ant Works Well With Others

There are certain plains in Africa where there are no elephants, and why? Because ants live there! Siafu ants number up to two million ants per colony. The soldiers will literally form a covered bridge made from their own interlinked bodies in order to protect the workers. They work so well together that they devour everything in their path and can even kill and eat an elephant. Consider the "elephants" confronting the Lord's church today: liberalism; denominationalism; Islam; secular humanism; the homosexual agenda; etc. When the Lord's body works together, these "giants" move (Num. 13:31-33; 14:9). Shall we pick up stones (Num. 14:10) or pick up one another (Gal. 6:2)? Infighting and disputing will destroy the work (II Tim. 2:23; Titus 3:9). Can we challenge ourselves not to fall in line with stone throwers but to work together to move the "elephants"?
