None of them knew; so the search for the missing flower arrangement was on.

The elders called a special meeting with the deacons and asked them to help locate this arrangement due to its great value; after all, the florist billed the church several hundred dollars for that arrangement. Throw-Back Thursday

There is a current trend that had developed on social media called "Throw-Back Thursday" where one posts online a photo or details of an event from their past. I have observed the older one gets the greater the tendency toward nostalgia. Looking back can be good or bad.

Consider some times when reflecting on the past is good.

- 1. Looking back to one's failures can produce humility. Paul frequently saw himself as the "chief of sinners" when he reflected on his previous behavior. (1Tim. 1:12-17; 1Cor. 15:9; Eph. 3:8).
- 2. Looking back to one's conversion is also beneficial as one sees the cleansing from his sins. Those who are failing to grow spiritually are reminded to do this (2Pet. 1:9; Rev. 2:5).
- 3. Looking back to the great examples in one's family (both physically and spiritually) can help one cope with our present. The Hebrew writer encouraged such with regards to those whose lives were worthy of emulating (Heb. 13:7).

But, looking back can also be harmful. It is easy to become satisfied with one's accomplishments in the past and become stagnant or even arrogant in the present. Paul looked back at his pedigree and considered such things as rubbish (dung). One must keep pressing on (Phil. 3:7-14).

The present needs our attention and the future lies before us. Its good to look back, but don't forget the present and the future.
