The following comment is taken from "The Central Exhorter" by Joe D. Gray and he is speaking of March 15 Atlanta paper I am sure, for he refers to it in another place in his bulletin. Joe's article follows: "COMGRATULATIONS TO THE MAYOR OF ATLANTA for his willingness to withstand public pressure in the interest of decency. Despite cries of persecution and partiality Mayor Hartsfield was standing pat on his order that no majorettes are to take part in parades in downtown Atlanta from henceforth. His reasons were(1) 'the racial tension' and (2) 'the fact that these scantily clad teen-agers can't keep up with the line of march sometimes and are forced to fight their way through the milling crowds'.







TEN COMMANDMENTS FOR PARENTS---SAN LEVENSON'S HOME REMEDIES FOR JUVENILE DELIN JUENCY.

The ten rules set forth by Mr. Levenson are worthy of our consideration. We realize that the Bible is the only source of information with authority, but when men of the world recognize the principles set forth in the Bible it should make Christians who are parents think more seriously of those things which the Bible teaches. MOVING TIME IS HERE AGAIN Ruel Lemmons, Editor

Relow we give you the editorial from the Firm Foundation for May 19, 1959. We believe it is timely and one that should be studied by elders and preachers throughout the country as well as every member of the church. If we do not have space in the bulletin to complete it we will continue it next week.

"School will soon be out and preachers will soon start moving. There is already a rustle in the air reminiscent of October. The leaves are about to fall! Soon the exchange of pulpits will resemble the old game, "Fruit-Basket-Turn-Over," Almost half the congregations in the brotherhood with local preachers will change preachers this year. What a scramble!

We wonder how long our brethren will continue the senseless practice of changing preachers every few months or years. If preachers do not preach the truth they should be dismissed, and not be rehired by someone else. If preachers do preach the truth what is the sense in swapping them off for other preachers who preach the same truth in just about the same way?

We recently heard of a congregation whose elders told the prospective preacher that two years was as long as they would want him; that they had an established policy of changing preachers every two years regardless. It made no difference how well he could do the Lord's work; it made no difference how the church was growing; it made no difference how badly the preacher felt he was needed in the community; these men were dead bent and determined to tear up the Lord's work at least every other year and start all over with a green hand. Every one of them would have had better sense than to fire his clerks every two years regularly.

We have been thinking about forming a new company. We think it would have a cinch on making a fortune from the day it was formed. It would be a moving company, and we would call it PREACHER MOVERS, INC. We would sell stock to all the preachers and would engage in moving preachers only. There would never be any empty hauls. We would simply take one preacher's belongings to a new town, pick up the belongings of the preacher who was leaving, take them to the town he was moving to, and there pick up the departing preacher's

things, and so on, ad infinitum! Think of the saving in time and expense of getting to a job! And, man, think of the guaranteed business we would have! Some of our rather optimistic figures report some 15,000 preachers. If each moved every other year, we would have 7,500 moving jobs a year! Anf if they averaged \$500 per move (which is very conservative) we would have a guaranteed gross business of \$3,750,000 per year! Brethren, we could make a fortune in this preacher moving business!

And all of tt would be off of the senseless practice of tearing up the Lord's work every two years while we change preachers!

Come to think of it, we would have a mighty hard job today finding in the New Testament the exact job and office of today's located preacher anyway. We are careful that the organization and government of the church be identical with the organization and government of the church of New Testament days. It must have elders; it must have deacons; etc. And it must have evangelists. Butbrethren, you can search the New Testament through without finding anything to correspond with the "hybred" Ewangelist-Elder-Church Manager office created in the church of today and vacated every two years, In all our carefulness to restore the New Testament pattern some very valuable work could be done right here.

In many instances the men who are doing the work we call "local preacher" (another term not found in the Hew Testament) are doing the work of elders, and are qualified to be elders. Perhaps the only reason we do not appoint them elders is that we are going to want them to move in a couple of years! Why not appoint them, if they are qualified, and if they are doing the work anyway, as elders of the churches, let them settle down to feed the flock in a certain place for the rest of their lives? That would stop in a sensible and scriptural way, a lot of this moving around.

Although the item never appears in the church budget, the preacher's moving expense is a sizable item. It usually is larger than the literature expense. It is as much as a gosvel meeting or more. And it is so useless! Churches change preachers, we suppose, in the hope of getting a better one, and preachers change congregations in the hope of getting a better one. And neither usually do. The last one is, on the average, about like the former one.
It would be good for churches to know that they had

They try to laugh the matter off for the millions they make each year from the sale of cigarettes. The makers of lye might as well say that their product is harless and to give it to children as the cigarette maker to claim there is no danger in the cigarette. If we had the nicotine in the concentrated form we receive other poisons in it would be many times more deadly. Why not placed the poisoned cigarette out of reach of the children by placing it under the poison label as the senator has proposed. Christians everywhere should cease the use of poisons in form of tobaccos and should teach the children to let it alone. God gave us a body in which our soul resides -- we should keep it clean and suitable for the Spirit of God to dwell in, because we are a temple of the Holy Spirit(1 Cor. 3:16,17; 6:19,20). 





It would be fine if each of our young people would sit down and memorize these statements and use them as an incentive to mental and spiritual growth.





WHAT IS YOUR STANDARD OF GIVING?

According to "Christianity Today" dated October 28, 1957 the following information is gained: "According to Southern Baptist Handbook, Mr. Average American, spends only 5 cents a day for religious and welfare causes. This is compared to that of 9 cents daily for tobacco, 15cents for alcoholic beverages, recreation 22cents and transportation(including that spent by those of our nation in foreign travel) 58 cents daily. Taxes 59 cents each day, food \$1.12 and other household \$2.30(including rent, clothes, medical, saving, etc)."

What is your standard? Five cents a day would be 35 cents per week. If you put in a dollar on Sunday and then miss for a few Sundays and never make up for the Sundays you are absent you may not average 35 I know of people who have deserted the cents a week. church of their Lord and of course have deserted Christ. Through all these years they never do anything to serve Christ. Maybe after ten or fifteen years they decide to be restored. They never try to make up in finances what they have kept back. This belongs to God, but they do not offer to repay what they owe him. In the Old Testament when Israel failed to give a tenth God said they robbed him- would not the same apply today. Would not a person who has failed to give as he/ she has prospered be robbing God? If not why not? "From the days of your fathers ye have turned aside from mine ordinances, and have not kept them. Return unto me, and I will return unto, saith Jehovah of hosts. But ye say, Wherein shall we return? Will a man rob God? yet ye rob me. But ye say, Wherein have we robbed thee? In tithes and offerings. Ye are cursed with the curse; for ye rob me, even this whole nation. Bring ye the whole tithe into the store-house, that there may be food in my house, and prove me now herewith, saith Jehovah of hosts, if I will not open youthewindows of heaven, and pour you out a blessing, that there shall not be room enough to receive it." (Mal.3:7-10). Birethren say we are not able to give a tithe -- if this bestrue read again the above passage and see that God will pour you out blessings when you completely obey his word. If we will give more, with

a sincere purpose of heart to please the Lord we will have more to give God and more to live on than we have had heretofore. Members of the church need to grow in faith from day to day. What is your standard of giving? Do you give at least 10% of your earnings to Christ? Do you rob God by withholding that which belongs to him? Have you forsaken the Lord and are you keeping his offeringsand spending them riotous living? Yes what is your standard? God knows and you know, but others merely guess. Be sure you give your gifts cheerfully and make themliberal.BCH.







Sisters as Christian women, will you continue to practice that which even the general public which is not Christian, frowns upon? Selected.



REPORTING FROM WEST CHESTER, PENNSYLVANIA.

On Sept. 10, Sister Holt, Mrs. Hobert Griffith who accompanied us as far as Wilmington, Delaware, and I was very pretty left for West Chester, Pa. The trip and we are thankful safe. Corrie and I arrived in Pennsylvania on Saturday. The meeting got under way Sept. 13 with good attendance for the local church and in the afternoon of the same day sister congregations of that section assembled for an hours singing. There were about 12 churches represented. When we consider twelve churches we include a small locality, but there it means more. Some were from Delaware and possibly some were from N. J. During the meeting we had people from N.J., Del., Tenn., Fla., Pa., and possibly W.Va., and Va and Md. One was baptized, three were identified with the local congregation, several attended who are not members of the church and one who had never been to a service of the church.

The church is at peace with themselves, and well respected in the community. They have the good will of the sister congregations as shown by their attending the meeting. Brother Mac. Langford was with us one time and so was Brother John Renshaw who left Tenn. last year to work with the 56 th Street church in Phildaelphia. We found one sour note in the work in that general section. In Elsmere, Delaware(where Edward Elrodand family worship it became necessary to get rid of the preacher, because of his liberal views on matters religious. He actually believes it right to use Instruments of music in the worship. This has for a time slowed the work in Elsmere, but they will continue to make growth, because they did not follow afterfalse doctrine. The preacher and a few with him have started meeting in Wilmington, but they are not recognized as faithful by the churches in that area.

Another asset for the cause is the beginning of the Northeastern Institute for Christian Education (N.I.C.E.). They had their beginning while we were in the section, and we were able to visit their plant and are happy to report they have a fine building and beautiful surroundings. The teachers for the college will add to the working force of the church and the growth in the Philadelphia section will be greater. We believe Bybee has undertaken a fine work in the selection of West Chester. They are a friendly group, diligently devoted to spreading the gospel in that section. Their opportunities are unlimited. They are making fine progress in their building program and we hope the building will be completed before 1960 shows its appearance. When men and women will mortgage their homes as security to obtain money for the building as several families did in West Chester, we may be confident that they are interested in the truth. We made some pictures of the construction and hope within the next few days to have them for showing at our next get together.

Two new records were established while we were there. We had more for Bible School last Sunday than they had ever had for worship previously. Their former high for worship was 103 and we had 107 for classes and 116 for worship services.

I don't think I have ever seen a more appreciative group than the West Chester Church. Since our return we have the following letter addressed to Bybee Branch: Dear Brothron:

We want to thank you for the support you are sending here to West Chester, Pa. We are closing one of the best meetings we ever had with Bro. Holt, Both Pro. and Sis. Holt are wonderful Christian people and we hope they have a long life together to do God's work.



While searching through some old copies of the "Christian Record", a periodical published by some brethren nearly one hundred years ago in Bedford, Indiana, I ran across this report by a brother Short.

"On Tuesday night(March 23, 1869), our meeting at Bloomington, Indiana of seventeen weeks and two days closed, resulting in two hundred and twenty four additions. About twelve from the baptists, and thirty from the Methodist, while both sects were holding protracted meetings during part of the time. More than one hundred were heads of families, and near the meridian of life, and of the most respectable citizens. No excitement at any time, and not more than six additions at any one meeting, and yet the interest continued to the close, and the auditorium was all the time filled, often a number had to go away for want of room Brother William Black preached one hundred and forty sermons, the last as interesting as the first. church, now numbering five hundred members, has been greatly edified, and manifest more of the Apostolic love and order, than is to be seen anywhere in this country. Mone of us ever witnessed a meeting of so much zeal and interest, or a preacher of such untiring energy. May we all 'hold fast the begun confidence firm to the end, and all be congregated around the throne of God forever." Bloomington Indiana Bulletin

More churches today have preaching each week than in the days when the above article was written, but even with this increase I doubt if the overall picture is better at the end of a given year in any given place among us. How many of our members would support a gospel meeting seventeen weeks and two days? In my observations we do not support it the two days, to say nothing of the seventten weeks. I observe the reaction regarding the services conducted by other preachers and find that the members rotate with one another. One will come tonight and another will stay at home, and tomorrow night they will reverse the order. If the half converted people, who claim to be members of the church, in Warren County would get behind a preacher in a meeting of one week duration we would accomplish so much that we would be amazed at the results which would follow. Attending the regular weekly services will accomplish much too -- try it and see!

REPORT FROM WEST CHESTER, PA.



"EVIL COMPANIONSHIPS CORRUPT GOOD MORALS"(1 COR.15:33)

Paul instructed the Corinthian Christians to not be deceived into believing evil companionships were all right. Hear him! "Be not deceived: Evil companionships corrupt good morals! Awake to soberness righteously and sin not; for some have no knowledge of God: I speak this to move you to shame."(1 Cor. 15:33,34). Through the ensuing years men and women have tried to prove they are exceptions to this law of God. I knew a man, who called himself a gospel preacher, who said if his children could not run with all types and remain pure, then they were not right to begin with. He said if a drunkard could not control himself to such degree that he could place a keg of whisky on the edge of the pulpit without wanting a drink he had not broken himself of the drinking habit. Both these ideas are contray to Paul's instruction.

Within the last few years Pat Boone has undertaken to prove that a Christian can be a part of Hollywood without being corrupted in his life and influence. Pat has a tremendous following among the young people of the nation, and many of them are of the church. They will do whatever they see Pat doing. Pat is waging a losing battle with sin. Even now he does things that he once refrained from doing. He advocates things which will set the wrong example before the world. In a recent interview at Nashville he said, " If at all possible I'd like to avoid a situation like that. But if there was a moral to it and it was obvious to all-that if it showed alcohol or crime didn't pay, then I would." Then he would do what? The reporter had just stated that "Teen-age hero Pat Boone said yesterday he would drink whisky, smoke a cigaret and play the role of a dope addict in movies--if the circumstances warranted it. " The "then he would" means that Pat would "drink whisky, smoke a cigaret and be a dope addict for the money he would receive -- if the circumstances warranted it. Not too long ago he wrote a lady he would not engage in dancing any more if it would cause her daughter to dance--well doesn't he know that his fans will do what their hero does? But Pat has slipped to the point that he wants us to do away with passionate love making and have clean kissing, Hear Him! "Teenagers can now see the most passionate kinds of scenes in adult movies. If they're going to have love scenes let's have a clear wholesome picture of it." But Pat had just said "movie kissing is realistic". —it must be for he said, when he and Diane Baker kissed, "Diane and I enjoyed it." Thus we see the morals are giving way to Hollywood's standard.

We have preachers among us who close their eyes to the wearing of shorts etc. because congregations for which they preach want to be like the world. Evil companionships do corrupt good morals. 
