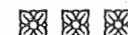

#### HONOR TO WHOM HONOR IS DUE

We believe the child who shows interest in attending the Bible classes and being regular in attendance along with a devotion to studying the lessons should be rewarded for his/her efforts to encourage more devotion to duty. To have a full understanding on the part of all, the teachers met Sunday evening with the elders, and, the following awards will be offered and under the conditions named. These rules were set forth by the teachers (with the approval of the elders), so the ruling is not the preachers, but the conditions are the approved suggestions made by the teachers. We suggest the parents save this sheet for future use of your children. The awards follow:

1. PERFECT ATTENDANCE--to be given to the children who are present every Sunday for Bible study--attendance some other place does not count. The child must be present at Bybee Branch to receive this award.
2. ANNUAL AWARD--The children who work for the awards (smaller children) are nearly all subject to the children's diseases and may have to miss a Sunday or two through the year. To encourage them to faithfulness the annual award is given to all who miss no more than two Sundays in a year. Those who receive the perfect attendance reward will receive the annual reward also (the first year a pin and thereafter a bar which says second year or third year etc. This is a double incentive to be here every Sunday.
3. NINE MONTH'S AWARD--The children who attend nine months without missing (either Jan. 1- Sept. 30 or April 1-Dec. 31) will receive this pin. A child may be absent one time during this period and still receive the award. This allows for illness. The award will not be given on a skip through the year and find enough Sundays to make up nine months.
4. SIX MONTH AWARD. The child who attends from Jan. 1 through June 30 or July 1 through Dec. 31 and misses no more than one Sunday will receive this award.
5. THREE MONTH AWARD. Children who come three months without missing will receive honorable mention (no pin) for their reward. We hope to have all the records completed and be able to give the awards Sunday Jan. 13 or not later than Jan. 20. The records may not be complete enough to have them ready Sunday, but be there with your children both Sundays for the awards.

The two Sundays absent for the annual award pin or the one Sunday missed for the nine month or six month pin may include being out of town with parents. The child should bring a slip of paper the next week from the parents stating they attended Bible school elsewhere.

### THE BLESSING OF A BREWERY

Some days ago Fort Worth had a gala affair. Carling's Brewery held a ground breaking for a multi-million dollar plant at the South edge of town. Political dignitaries were all over the place. A train from Dallas made a special run for the occasion. An invocation was given both by Catholic and Protestant clergymen. Thus it received not only the political, but also the social and religious sanction which it sought. Many speeches were made to show how this brewery would bless our city! And from the very first, editorial comment and complete news coverage in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram has boosted the enterprise. Just two days later, however, the following news item also appeared in the same paper:

"A projection reveals that by 1970, between 400,000 and 500,000 Texans will be affected by alcoholism. Frank Cain, of Austin, a representative of the Texas Commission on Alcoholism, told the sixth annual membership meeting of the Tarrant County Council on Alcoholism Thursday that there are an estimated 250,000 to 300,000 alcoholics in Texas today."

The same treatment now applied to the problem of alcoholism if applied to deadly snake bites would be to spend fortunes on research for antidotes while importing more deadly snakes into our society and pointing out the increased taxes our laboratories are paying in for their increased payrolls. But why not kill the snakes! Should we grant that alcoholism is a disease, isn't it the part of good sense to try to eradicate the disease? Check back to see how much the United States spent to eradicate the malaria mosquito when it learned that this was the cause of the disease in Panama! Then why not wipe out the "Carrier" of alcoholism? But instead, we even send out "clergy" to "bless" the spawning ground in this loathsome disease. I wonder how God accepted the prayers of those pushers of this current evil as they "invoked his blessings" on a brewery? We would guess that the closing song was, "Little brown Jug, How I love Thee."

BUFORD AND CORRIE HOLT WILL MOVE TO GREENVILLE, S.C.

As was announced last Sunday, September 15, Buford and Corrie Holt will soon move to the big mission field of South Carolina. Their base of operation will be with the POINSETT CHURCH OF CHRIST 2101 Poinsett Highway, Greenville, S.C. The church has about 80 members and is self supporting. They hope to grow to the point of being able to evangelize the state within a few years. Greenville is the second largest city in the state and is a fast growing community. A home for the Holts should be under construction by the time you receive this bulletin. We have enjoyed a very pleasant work with the church at Bybee Branch and leaving will be extremely difficult, but we covet your prayers and look to the new work with great anticipations for growth. A look backward by way of summing the things done here we find several good things done. This week we will note the physical changes at Bybee and next week, the Lord willing we will note the spiritual accomplishments here.

A SUMMARY OF OUR LABORS TOGETHER FOR CHRIST. NO. 1.

On October 27, 1962, Buford C. Holt and his family began working with the Bybee Branch church. Since that time we have purchased carpeting for the auditorium. A new communion table and pulpit stand have been made. Six head sets have been added to the public address system to aid those hard of hearing. The ceiling speakers added (six in the auditorium) to better balance the sound. A tract rack has been made, a bulletin board erected in the foyer and one in the basement, while a board for keeping a record of attendance and displaying needed information has been placed at the rear of the auditorium. The class rooms and auditorium have been redecorated more than once. A heater for the baptistry installed, lighting arrangement for the class rooms completely changed and a library started. The heating system has been completely changed and air conditioning added at a total cost of \$8,844.00. Much has been done to eliminate a water problem in the basement, including the addition of a small room to protect the basement steps. Nine special stands for the class rooms have been constructed, these are

each compact, but contain the space of a chalk board 16 ft. long and 4 ft. wide. A storage room for teachers to keep their materials has been made and additional class rooms made with shelving placed in the class rooms already in use. An opaque projector and screen have been purchased for teachers' use. A tape recorder purchased for taping our singing for the radio programs. The church grounds have been improved by clearing the brush from the space at the rear of the building and making a recreational area. A pavilion 20x30 feet added with hanging table. Four park type tables and benches have been added to make this a real recreational area with lights, both spot and mercury vapor type. Road signs have been added which were followed by several highway signs by sister churches of the county.

At the minister's home much work has been done by the preacher to make it a better house. A stairway has been added to make it safe for all who use it, removal of a wall to enlarge room space, a combination work and snack bar added to the kitchen and cabinet space also to this area. Storage space in the attic and a sewing room made and equipped with cabinet space; insulation added to the building. The bath room reworked and linen storage space added. Book cases made in the study and storage space for blankets added in the hall. Carpeting has been placed in the living and dining rooms. The house redecorated inside and outside. The grounds have been improved by landscaping and shrubbery added. A light installed at the end of the walk for safety measures, the basement doors remade to permit closing and a water battier placed to keep surface water out of the basement. Much of the work on the home has been done by the preacher and family and at their personal expense. Much remains undone, but lack of time and finances necessitated their being left for the next or some future occupant. The things done at the church building and part of those at the home have been done by our working together. They could not have been accomplished by one person alone. Our prayer is that these accomplishments may be used to glorify God and help humanity. Next week The spiritual growth of the church while with you will be reported. Please keep this for a record if your memory is short. BCH.

#### UNITED FUND DRIVES BY L.L. GIEGER.

To show good citizenship, many companies require their employees to contribute to the United Fund when the drive is being made. This poses a big problem to the Christian because his conscience warns him that part of the money will go to support false doctrine, and yet his employer and fellow workers will make it most unpleasant for him if he does not make a contribution. The fund apportioned out to the Roman Catholic church, other Catholic churches, Jewish welfare agencies, and different ~~protestant~~ organizations, all of which he ~~believes~~ <sup>the</sup> to be teaching things contrary to the Bible, and few non-religious works that he can support in all good conscience. Too, he knows that he can specify which charity will receive his check, but that this only releases the amount of his gift to the others, and that he has actually supported them. Many, Christian employees and employers alike, find themselves in great difficulty each year. As they forget the matter from last year another drive gets under way.

Is there a solution for the problem? Is there a way for God's children to get out of this dilemma. Can they keep their company's 100% record, and at the same time be able to avoid paying for error to be taught? The following is a plan that they are adopting most effectively.

When the drive is on, they make out their checks for the amount suggested, but instead of writing "The United Fund" on its face, they write, "Christ' Haven For Children, Keller, Texas." Tipton Orphan Home, Boles Orphan Home, Home for Aged, and so on, with the city address, would be just the same. This check is given to those who are taking the contribution, and when it is turned in to the "Fund" headquarters it is sent to the proper place for final use. These are charitable organizations as are those that the "United Fund" proposes to help, but do not receive anything from the drive unless checks are made out specifically to them. Thus the contribution will be counted toward 100% participation by the company as much so as it would were the check made out for any other of the charities people provide, yet will neither give nor release one penny to teach false doctrines that the Fund supports.

#### IN MEMORIAM TO LEMUEL E. SPAIN

Death claimed the life that is mortal of one of God's saints October 2, 1963. Lemuel E. Spain lived upon this earth eighty and five years or approximately that long. During those years upon earth he placed his soul in the hands of Him who conquered death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. In giving his life to Christ he was given assurance that his soul would not die, but live forever. Thus we rejoice in this time of loss in the great promises of God which became a reality through the death of Christ upon the cross.

I knew Brother Spain for six years, lacking less than a month, but regret to say that I never knew him when his health permitted him to be actively engaged in the work of the local congregation. A few years before we came to Bybee Branch brother Spain served as one of the elders of the local church and I am sure that the associations with him and the other elders was a pleasure for the preacher or preachers who served here. Brother Spain attended the services for a short time after our arrival, and then it became necessary for him to confine his life to the house and the young people for two winters went in to his and other sick folk's homes and conducted brief services each week. Failure of health caused him to spend his last days in the veteran's hospital in Murfreesboro. Brother Ernest Laws, a close friend of the Spain family all his life, brought words of comfort to the family. May his good deeds live on in the hearts of those who remain to mourn his death.

#### IN MEMORIAM TO CALVIN RAY

"As in Adam all die" is a definite statement of the Bible, and it comesto young and old alike. Last week two old people, connected with Bybee Branch by relatives, were called to meet the Lord. Today, Oct. 8, 1963, death came to one of our young men--Calvin Ray, who lived only 25 years, and most of these were years of suffering and inactivity. In spite of his poor health, which seems to have started with Polio when he was about 8 years of age, Calvin finished high school and took a business course between stays in the hospital and the periods of seeking health

after leaving hospitals. Calvin served as custodian of the church building when we moved to Bybee Branch but more than two years ago it became necessary to cease these activities. When he underwent surgery the last time he was left blind and deaf and has had to be cared for as an infant for months. His parents have given him undivided attention and they have done all that they could possibly have done to relieve him of his afflictions, but to no avail. Calvin Ray's friends were numerous and all liked him because of his friendliness and smile for all whom he met. It is indeed a grief to see those so young suffer and depart, but the God who rules the world does all things well and we who are left should be reminded that death is no respecter of persons. Calvin will be remembered as one who bore his suffering with a smile and without complaining. He shall be long remembered for his smile and friendly disposition. We extend sincere sympathy to the whole family in this loss and in their grief.

I think all who attended the meeting last Sunday afternoon at 3 P.M. will agree the young men did a fine job in making speeches and leading singing and prayers. ### AN IDEAL AUDIENCE

What kind of an audience do you think that a preacher would like most to address? One that is large? Small? One made up exclusively of young people? Of working men and women? Of elderly saints? Sinners? A lot of things would have to be considered before drawing a final conclusion, but an ideal audience was before the Apostle Peter on the occasion described in Acts 10.

1. It was God-fearing. People that have been taught to respect the Creator and give attention when he is speaking are wonderful listeners to gospel preachers. The wise man said, "Fear God, and keep his commandments: for this is the whole duty of man"(Eccles.12:13), and when a person has been taught to do this he listens with a worshipful attitude that is ever sought but not always seen in religious gatherings.

2. It was studious. The best teachers do not desire students that never question the material that is being presented for a mind that drinks in everything that comes its way is not alert and strong. Luke described the people of Berea as being more noble than those of Thessalonica because of their readiness to receive the word together with determination to examine it in the light of the scriptures(Acts 17:11). To be studious is a worthy goal that is within reach of all who have the right use of their minds.

3. It was capable. The audience that Peter addressed was not only able to hear and understand the message, it was one already noted for its enthusiasm, its eagerness, and its moral distinction. Cornelius was highly regarded by all who knew him, and those that he assembled to hear the apostle came with a willingness to act on whatever material was presented them. This made his hearers to compose an audience of distinction, and when his message was delivered it was acted upon wisely and conversions to Christ resulted.

Such an audience is just as possible now as it was in the days when Peter lived. We can make our gatherings to be as ideal as we make ourselves to be God-fearing, studious, and determined to do whatever may be the Lord's desire for us. Purpose in your heart to make your part of the audience ideal this Sunday. Luther L. Gieger, West Berry Church Bulletin.

After all we are children of God and we are doing His work, not only because he wants it done but because the only real joy of living comes from serving him. If you allowed yourself to tire of the real values of life, then for your own happiness and eternal salvation check up on your sense of values."

"And now I commend you to God, and to the word of his grace, which is able to build you up, and to give you the inheritance among all them that are sanctified" (Acts 20:32).

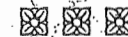

# A READY ANSWER AT ALL TIMES.

"I don't believe in your God," one recounted recently as having been told by another. "He lived upon earth more than nineteen hundred years ago and I don't want to have to follow someone that has been dead for that long."

"Dead for that long?" was the questioning answer. "You surely must be mistaken about that: you see, I was talking with him just before you came into the room."

You may not have at all times such a perfect reply on the tip of your tongue as was this, but neither should you be intimidated by any kind of belittling of your God as saying that he has been dead for centuries. There is not a word of truth in it, and there is no reason for you to be afraid to stand up for what you have been taught to believe about his existence. He is as much alive as you are, and your faith is to be so strong that you will defend him against all attacks. Affirm your belief by word and confirm it by faithful attendance at services.

Some have the idea that Christianity is old and out of date, or that we have outgrown it. Part of the reason for this is that they have not taken advantage of their opportunities to study it and see whether or not it is no longer any good, and part of it is that what some call Christianity is so disgusting that they are of no mind to investigate it and see what it really is. Bigotry, religious begging, issuing of ultimatums, contentions among themselves, and so on is what the world has sometimes had to see claiming to be the religion of Christ. It is no wonder that people have turned from such and they will continue to do so.

What is the religion of Christ? It is peace with God and, if possible, with all mankind (Rom. 12:18). It is the forgiveness of sins before God and intending to live free from them, He being one's helper (1 John 2:1-3). It is a conscientious effort to do right socially, spiritually, morally, economically, eternally (Acts 8:31). It is a sincere effort to find scriptural, logical, scientific and unquestionable answers to the problems; where did I come from? Why am I here? what is my duty? and, whither am I bound? (Gen. 2:7; Acts 17:24-47; Heb. 9:27; Matt. 25:31-46). As long as these questions are asked Christianity will be new and fresh. L.L.Gieger

The subject of the foregoing article is deserving of our consideration, because Jesus taught us, through the apostle Peter to, Be "ready always to give answer to every man that asketh you a reason concerning the hope that is in you, yet with meekness and fear: having a good conscience; that, wherein ye are spoken against, they may be put to shame who revile your good manner of life in Christ" (1 Peter 3:15,16). This is not always easy because some ask for reasons which are unethical. The enemies of Christ often sought to "trap" him in some manner. When we know we are being placed on the spot for matters of embarrassment it is hard to maintain our calmness and composure, but we should study as to be able to answer with kindness when kindness is needed and with sharpness when sharpness is needed. We are to follow both of the following verses: "Answer not a fool according to his folly, lest thou also be like unto him. Answer a fool according to his folly, lest he be wise in his own conceit" (Proverbs 26:4, 5). The person who knows when to refuse to answer the fool according to his folly and then when to answer him according to his folly is a person who has studied God's word for a long time with diligence. He will be like the people of Berea who searched the scriptures daily to see if the things taught are true (Acts 17:11). The wisdom to answer people properly at all times is not poured into the brain, but is embedded there through years of study, hard work and patience in dealing with humanity-- the just and unjust; the good and bad; the righteous and the unrighteous.

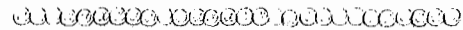
Do not despair of learning this lesson. Continue to study and work. Do not expect results if you fail to study, work or have patience to continue trying to assist those who need you. Even when you have gained some knowledge and earned some degree of success your rewards will be most gratifying. Helping others and bringing happiness to a troubled and distressed world is most satisfying to your own heart and the happiness you bring into the world is two-fold. It helps those who need it and you are made happy also. So strive to have a ready answer at all times. Not the cutting, hateful kind but the kind that is needed to bring God glory, convict the sinful and encourage the sincere, troubled souls. 3. When Mormons and Jehovah's witnesses have more zeal than we have. . . It is a fact that these people make thousands of personal calls each day. There are many members of the church that never win a soul for Christ. Read Mark 16:16; 1 Cor. 9:16; Rom. 1:14-16.

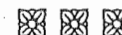

We have prayed about this grave matter and are deliberating on what should be done. Despite preaching, admonitions in the church bulletin and personal visits, you are still absent from most of the services. You have promised to "do better" but as yet you haven't kept that promise.

Now, what would you advise us to do? Shall we continue to count you as a member, or shall we drop your name from the roll? Do you wish to come and prayerfully discuss your problem? Would you advise us to withdraw fellowship from you, since your negligence is a hindrance to the Lord's Work? In Christian love. Signed by the elders.

A similar letter was sent to the delinquent members of a Texas congregation. There are at Bybee Branch a number of members who fall into the above class. They attend very seldom except on Sunday morning and there are quite a few who have completely quit attending at all. Some who attend are living in sin and think they have their immorality hidden, but they are kidding only themselves. They do not have their sins hid from the members to say nothing of hiding them from the Lord. Within the not too distant past withdrawal action was carried out against one wayward member and he has been restored and is now busy working in another community for the Lord. There are others within the congregation who need to be treated likewise both for their good and for the good of the church.

DR. WERNHER VON BRAUN'S STATEMENT REGARDING THE SOUL

The following article appeared in the bulletin from Bloomington, Indiana April 14, 1963 and is given for your appraisal. We quote:

"Last Monday evening several of us here in Bloomington heard the world's foremost scientist, Dr. Wernher Von Braun, speak. Afterward we were privileged to witness the press conference. Possibly what impressed us most was his simplicity. He took time to talk to every child who had a question. His answers were framed in such a way children could understand him. Below is a statement from this great scientist regarding the soul of man.

"Many people seem to feel that science has somehow made 'religious ideas' untimely or old-fashioned. But I think science has a real surprise for the skeptics. Science, for instance, tells us that nothing in nature, not even the tiniest particle, can disappear without a trace. Nature does not know extinction. All it knows is transformation. Now, if God applies this fundamental principle to the most minute and insignificant parts of His universe, doesn't it make sense to assume that He applies it also to the human soul? I think it does. And everything science has taught men . . . and continues to teach me. . . strengthens my belief in the continuity of our spiritual existence after death. Nothing disappears without a trace."

Dr. Von Braun said in his speech last Monday night that an old lady complained once that man ought not try to go to the moon. He said she asked, "Why can't man just mind his own business and stay at home and watch television just like the good Lord intended?"

Before his television appearance that night Jay Newbern asked Dr. Von Braun for a "mike check". Jay began by saying, "Testing, 1-2-3-4-", and then handed the microphone to the rocket expert who replied, "4-3-2-1." The quotation has been given to show you that men who know science realize that the Bible and Bible teaching are not opposed to or contrary to real scientific facts, but rather they agree. Men of science in the main see the hand of God in the workings of nature and the movements of the universe.

BURDENS OR BRIDGES?

Did you ever watch an ant carry a load much larger and heavier than itself, and were you intrigued with its ability to handle the huge object so adroitly?

On a porch recently, waiting for an answer to the door bell, I saw again such a sight. An ant, nearing a crack in the sidewalk, was carrying-dragging a straw four or five times its own length. I wondered what would be done when it got to the crack. Almost without hesitating, it surveyed the chasm, placed the straw across it, walked over on the "Bridge," picked it up again, and resumed its journey. The burden was actually a blessing of which I was wholly unaware.

Why do we not take more lessons from the little creatures that are around us? As in this case, it is possible that our burdens are blessings in disguise, and that they are really bridges when properly viewed and used.

A great burden is sickness! Few would choose it as the load for themselves were they given a choice, but it can accomplish much good if used wisely. One does not appreciate good health until it is lost, and one cannot nurse the sick back to health with the same tenderness before an illness that he can afterward. Using sickness then to make one a better minister is but making it to be a thing of profit rather than one of loss.

The death of loved ones is a great burden! The loss of companions, children, parents is a grievous load that rests on the shoulders of humanity, but who has experienced it without being better able to sympathize with others who are trudging beneath it in the dark valley each day? Such experience grants better understanding of the meaning of the Lord's presence, and of his kindness and concern for his people. The burden becomes a bridge, and is ^{no} proof at all of God's inability to protect his own.

And what a burden is sin! Those who have wept through its remorse have knowledge of its weight, but the forgiven sinner is most appreciative of the Christ, and most determined to lead others from under the yoke into the glorious liberty of sons. One should not go into sin to determine its weight, but deliverance should make one a powerful influence for good to others, and will if the one makes the burden serve its rightful purpose. L.L.
