"THE HEART OF THE MATTER"

In David's famous address concerning the temple, he directs this remark to his son, Solomon:

"And thou, Solomon my son, know thou the God of thy Father, and serve him with a perfect heart and with a willing mind; for Jehovah searcheth all hearts and understandeth all the imaginations of the thoughts. If thou seek him, he will be found of thee; but if thou forsake him, he will cast thee off forever! (I Chron. 28: 9.)

Would to God that all Christian parents would convey the same lesson to their youngsters!

This passage emphasizes PERFECTION OF HEART. How hard it is to keep our hearts right! It is the greatest challenge in life, for so many influences tend to corrupt the heart. Worldly wealth, power, or intellect tempts us to pride. Beauty tempts us to lust. Wrong tempts us to bitterness. Yet the heart that is proud, lustful or bitter is far from perfect. If one is to obey this injunction, he must constantly repel the imps which would defile his inner man. Outer influences, no matter what they may do to the body, must never mislead the heart. If they do, the actions will become wrong and monstrous misdeeds will result.

David also stressed WILLINGNESS OF MIND. One's talents, his education, his physical resources mean little to the cause of Christ if he does not possess this trait. Stubbornness is often unfortunate. Just as children rebel against their parents because they dislike the restrictions placed upon them and because they want to do as they please, so beoble refuse God's will because it denies them the right to choose their own course and confines them to a specified kind of conduct. God cannot approve the attitude of the headstrong and the self-willed.

God's knowledge OF THE INNER MAN IS ABSOL-UTE. He "searcheth all hearts." His eyes are quick to discern any filthy spot upon the heart; and on the basis of this inspection of the inner man, he judges. He "understandeth all the imaginations of the thoughts." If I think angry, envious, jealous or suspicious thoughts--if I draw pictures of lustful indulgence upon the tablet of my mind, he sees them all. Deception and conspiracy are no secret to him.

If in our minds and hearts we seek him, we shall find him! What a blessed assurance! But if in our thoughts we forsake him and give ourselves over to filthiness, he will cast us off—and the casting off will be eternal. This is the most dreadful of fates! Oh, Mighty One! Deliver us from it! Keep our thoughts pure! —Billy Earl Williams.



But there is something that precedes this Divine action. God himself must exist. Before the creation, there must be the Creator. The sacred Book speaks of God's power, of his com -passion, of his goodness, of his infinite wisdom; but it makes little or no attempt to prove the being of God. Every writer assumes that God is and on that assumption proceeds. This is a remarkable fact. How do we account for it? "One certainly is," says one scholar, "that God has set the proof of his existence so abundantly on his other handiwork that he did not need to rewrite them in his book.

"AS FOR ME AND MY HOUSE"

It was Joshua who said, "Choose you this day whom ye will serve...but as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." (Josh. 24: 15.)

Joshua, the intrepid successor of Moses, stood tall and firm before the Israelites. He sought to confirm their faith and to encourage their obedience to God. There was no egotism in his character, but there was grim determination, unswerving faith, and indomitable courage. These were very necessary to the conquest of Canaan, and to the influential leadership of Israel. To his everlasting credit it is stated, "And Israel served the Lord all the days of Joshua, and all the days of the elders that outlived Joshua." (Josh. 24: 31.) It is particularly praiseworthy that he not only resolved to serve the Lord, but that he also intended that his family should serve the Lord.

Note that Joshua and all Israel had the privilege of choice. Just as it was in the days of Joshua, so now people can choose whom they will serve. God has no draftees in His army....only volunteers. Today we need the same excellent characteristics that Joshua manifested....the same grim determination, the same unswerving faith, the same indomitable courage, and the same wise decision. 

That was a common accusation against Paul and Silas and others who told the story of Jesus. The false emphasis given to this state—ment never failed to stir up the unthinking rabble. They helped to spread the impression that Jesus would lead a new party in direct opposition to existing government. The preach—ers of old taught truly that Jesus is king; but, the real significance of that great stat—ement was distorted by those who handled car—elessly the words that were spoken.

"Be subject to every ordinance of man for the Lord's sake: whether to the king, as supreme; or unto governors, as sent by him for vengeance on evil-doers and for praise to them that do well. For so is the will of God, that by well-doing ye should put to silence the ignorance of foolish men."

"Servants, be in subjection to your master -s with all fear; not only to the good and gentle, but also to the froward."

"In like manner, ye wives be in subjection to your own husbands...."

WHICH WAY?

Youth might well be called the most import -ant period in the life of any person. The reason for saying this is quite obvious. In youth we face the "fork in the road of life." That is, the path that we choose to follow in youth is usually the path that we will take all through life. Statistics show that the majority of those who ever obey the gospel do so before they reach the age of twentyfive. This serves to illustrate the importance of choosing the right way while we are still young.

Seeing, then, that we do have a very important decision to make, let's ask ourselves

this question, "which way should I go?"

Before we make the final decision, let's consider, briefly, the choice of routes. Before we would think about going on a vacation or making a long trip, we would sit down and consider the possible places to go and the best route to follow in getting safely there. This decision that we are considering is far more important than such decisions as vacation spots. The answer we give to this question will have an eternal significance. Therefore, let's make the decision thoughtfully and wisely.

First of all, think about the possible routes. There are only two choices open to us In Matthew 7: 13-14, Christ refers to them as the "strait-gate-and-narrow-way" route, and the "wide-gate-and-broad-way" route. Christ urged that we enter the former in preference to the latter. He even gives us the reason for his admonition. The "strait-gate-and-narrow-way" route leads to eternal bliss and joy On the other hand, the alternative way leads to everlasting destruction and misery for those who travel it.

Secondly, let's consider the company that we would be keeping on each of the two ways. In the "broad-way" we would be keeping company with others on the way to destruction. This would include "the fearful, and unbelieving, and the abominable, and murderers, and all liars. "(Rev. 21: 8.)

However, in the other way, we would be tra -veling with the elect of God. (Col. 3: 12-13) This means traveling with fellow Christians-the "holy and beloved," with "bowels of mercies, kindness, humbleness of mind, meekness, longsuffering" being characteristic of our companions.

Young man, or young lady, the choice is yours to make. But as you make your choice for life, do so "knowing that of the Lord ye shall receive the reward of the inheritance: for ye serve the Lord Christ. But he that doeth wrong shall receive for the wrong which he hath done: and there is no respect of persons." (Col. 3: 24-25.) -- Rubel Shelly.

JULY 28, 1965 WHY CHRISTIANS SHOULD BE KIND

Kindness is one of the qualities that the Lord would have all of his people to develop within themselves. "And be ye kind one to an -other," is one of the many similar expressions that inform Christians of this duty. (Eph. 4: 32.) Here are some of the reasons for this command.

1. Lest God's image be marred. Nehemiah wrot -e that God is a being of great kindness (Neh 9: 17), and Jesus declared that the Highest is kind unto the unthankful and to the evil " (Luke 6: 35.) There is no question about him being kind to the appreciative and to the good, but that he is the same toward the others is the lesson here. To fail to be kin -d then would mar the image.

2. That they may reach the lost. Nothing pre -pares the soil of the heart like kindness of speech and of treatment. There is really no reason for God's people to be unkind at any time. Others may be but why should saint -s let the world set the pattern for their behavior? They should be seeking to influence the ungodly rather than permitting themselves to be led astray by them.

3. For their own happiness. There is no true joy connected with living in unkindness. Whe -n one has exhibited this trait he is not any happier, those watching are not any better, and the one on whom the unkindness fell is miserable. To be happy at the close of the day one must be able to remember kindnesses that were his lot to show all that he met. A poet has said,

"I have wept in the night at the short-

ness of sight

That to somebody's need made me blind: But I never have yet felt a tinge of regret

At being a little too kind." 4. No other course will pay such big dividends. Most people are interested in good returns on their investments, and nothing will pay more than this. The attitude of practically all that are met will be changed by an arbibition of kindness Ware ware being sug-

gested by which it is shown, these would be uppermost: remember to smile; say "Thank you" for each thing done for you; never fail to give others due credit; express appreciation often; never be cross with anyone; control your temper and your tongue; notice things to commend in others; and, go out of your way to be friendly. -- L. Gieger.

AUGUST 11, 1965 . SINS OF THE TONGUE

"And the tongue is a fire. The tongue is an unrighteous world among our members, stain -ing the whole body, setting on fire the cycl -e of nature, and set on fire by hell."
(James 3: 6, RSV.)

More sins are committed through the misuse and abuse of the tongue than by any other member of the body. Men and women who would never think of stealing, or drinking, or gambling, or killing are often guilty of sinning by what they say. This is true because so many people make no effort at all to control the tongue. They are constantly talking during all waking moments, and some of them even talk in their sleep! Solomon wrote: "in multitude of words there wanteth not sin." (Prov. 10: 19.)

There is the sin of filthy communication which Paul urged the Colossians to put out of their mouths. (Col. 3: 8.) Language can be clean and decent, or it can be filthy and obscene. Filthy communication comes from a fil-

thy mind.

The sin of profanity is frequently heard. Using the name of the Lord vainly or by unnecessary swearing is a mark of living on a low plane of life. It is also a mark of ignorance denoting someone who does not have sufficient vocabulary to communicate with his fellow-man.

Gossip is the act of spreading unnecessary information about one's fellow man. Gossipping goes hand in hand with being a busy-body. Such use of the tongue is usually for the purpose of down grading the one who is the subject (or object) of such gossip. It is a violation of James command: "Speak not evil one of another, brethren." (James 4: 11.)

Most gossip is based on rumor. Even Though there is a semblance of truth on which the rumor is based, the rumor soon goes beyond any part of the truth. Gossipers often take delight in adding just a little bit to what they have heard. Or they delight in the exercise they get in "jumping to conclusions."

by people engaged in gossiping? It is an impossible task. You may be able to corner a thief, but you can't corner someone who delights in spreading rumors, half-truths, and near-lies about his fellow man.

"JESUS, THE JUDGE AND KING"
Matt. 25, 31-46.

In this great picture of the final judgment the prominent thought is separation: "He shall separate them one from another, as a shepherd divideth his sheep from the goats: and He shall set the sheep on His right hand, but the goats on the left." How easily and with what unerring certainty the separation is made--as easily and as surely as the shepherd divideth the sheep from the goats! Nothing eludes the glance of that all-searching Eye. No need of pleading or counterpleading, of prosecutor or prisoner's counsel, no hope from legal quibble or insufficient proof. All all is "naked and open unto the eyes of Him with whom we have to do. " He sees all at a glance; and as He sees, He divides by a singl -e dividing line. There is no middle position each one is either on the right or the left.

The dividing line is one entirely new. All nations are there; but not as nations are the -y divided now. This is strikingly suggested in the original by the change from the neuter (nations) to the masculine (them), indicating as by a sudden flash of unexpected light that not as nations, but as individuals, must all be judged. The line is one which crosses all other lines that have divided men from one another, so that of all ranks and conditions of men there will be some on the right and on the left. Even the family line will be crossed, so that husband and wife, parents and children, brothers and sisters, may be found on opposite sides of it. What, then, is this new and final line of separation? The sentence of the King will mark it out for us.

It is the first and only time that Jesus calls Himself the King. He had displayed His royalty in His acts; He has suggested it in His discourses and His parables; He has claimed it by the manner of His entry into His capital and His Temple; He will afterwards assert when Pilate shall ask Him the plain question; but this is the only place where He uses the title in speaking of Himself. How significant and impressive is this! It is as

disclose the fulness of His majesty. His royalty, indeed, was suggested at the very beginning by the reference to the throne of His glory; but inasmuch as judgment was the work which lay immediately before Him, He still spoke of Himself as the Son of man; but now that the separation is made, now that the books have been opened and closed, He rises above the Judge and styles Himself THE KING.

"And the angels which kept not their first estate, but left their own habitation, he hath reserved in everlasting darkness unto the judgment of the great day--." (Jude 6.)
"For if God spared not the angels that sinned but cast them down to hell (tartarus), and delivered them into chains of darkness to be reserved unto judgment." (II Peter 2: 4.)

In reference to one that had fallen, Isaiah remarks--. "How art thou fallen from heave
-n, O Lucifer; son of the morning. How art

SEPTEMBER 22, 1965 A SUCCESSFUL CHURCH

The church at Antioch of Syria was by all odds the most successful of all the New Testament churches. The churches at Jerusalem, Philippi, Corinth, and the seven churches in Asia were more or less successful; but none of them equated the church at Antioch. It was founded by a few refugee disciples "that were scattered abroad upon the tribulation that arose about Stephen, the first Christian martyr. They preached the Lord Jesus to the Antiochians. And the hand of the Lord was with these disciples: "and a great number that believed turned to the Lord." Conversions by the tens, hundreds and thousands began at once. By the end of the first century or soon thereafter there were probably one hundred thousand Christians in that city. Jerusalem, which had been in the forefront, began to fade and Antioch became the center of Christian interest. For more than two centuries this great church maintained the ascendency.

Acts 11: 19-30; Acts 13: 1-3.

Success is never accidental. It is always the result of definite causes. Neither men nor institutions happen by accident. Business professions, institutions, all have their fundamental laws of success. When these are applied, they work out inevitable success. When they are not followed, success is imposs—ible. There are certain laws by which nations grow, by which cities grow, by which churches grow. A careful reading of the selections from the book of Acts will bring to light the secrets of growth of this great New Testament church.

I. TEACHERS. There were "teachers" in the Ant -iochian church. No church can make progress without members who are dedicated to the work of teaching God's word.

II.UNITY. No racial distinctions were made. Though composed of Jewish and Gentile Christians, no discordant tone was heard in Antioch. Disunity will cause any church to dwindle--to waste away.

III.BENEVOLENCE. When dire need arose, the entire congregation responded, "every man

OCTOBER 6, 1965 THE VICES OF COVETOUSNESS

"And he said unto them, Take heed, and keep yourselves from all covetousness: for a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth." (Luke 12:15)

Covetousness is an excessive desire for material things. Our invisible desires in the mind are like the invisible vapor that arises from the earth to become showers of rain to fall upon the earth. If one of these desires becomes too big, then it is called covetousness, and falls upon our lives with a sinful impact. To desire material things for their proper use and employ them for God's purposes and plans is no sin. But if the desire is so big that we hold on to these material things and hoard them for our own selfish end, then we make material things an idol in our lives. "Put to death therefore your members which are upon the earth: fornication, uncleanness, passion, evil desire, and covetousness, which is idolatry." (Col. 3: 5.)

He who withholds from the offering on Lord -'s day that which rightly belongs to the Lord, and which should be given to Him in praise and worship, that one is covetous. And in being covetous Paul says he is an idolater He is an idolater because his money is first in his life. The object that you make first in your life is your God. Some people put mon -ey first, others put pleasure first, and others put fame first. It matters not what you put first -- that which is first in your life, which gathers up your energy and first devotion becomes your god. So covetousness is a grievous sin because it displaces the true God, for a god of things. God is only worthy of first place in our lives.

Covetousness despoils life at its source. That is the reason we must take heed and keep ourselves from all covetousness. Material things are not the source of the best and hap piest and fullest living. An abundance of things will not guarantee a full life, notwithstanding the thinking of millions of people to the contrary. So many think of real and abundant living to be found in the possess.

ssion of an exceeding amount of material things. But this is not true, says Jesus. A desire for material things that they may be used to the glory of God is proper and good.

The rich farmer in Luke 12 filled his barns thinking that real life consisted in the abundance of material things. But life slipped away and death came just when he thought he was ready to enjoy the filled barns. And so it is with the covetous. We often worry about running out of money but we usual -ly run out of life before we run out of money. May God help us to hold the true yiew of life, keeping ourselves from all covetousness which opens a floodgate of poisons into life.

OCTOBER 27, 1965 GLORY OF THE PASSIVE VIRTUES

We celebrate in our day the active virtues -- preaching the word, visiting the sick, defending the gospel from the inroads of modernism, helping the needy with material things. But we forget the great power of the passive virtues--patience, meckness, forbearance, for giveness, peace, love. We may be somewhat arbitarary in classifying the virtues as active and passive inasmuch as there are both active and passive elements in all the vibtues, however, it remains that we shall do well to remember the glory of the submissive virtues.

To emphasize the passive virtues should never be interpreted as a discouragement to be active. All the great men of God have been active. Surely Jesus was most active from the beginning to the end of His ministry. Faith is a virtue that is meant large expansion and to restrain its expression will fester the soul.

Look at Jesus when He has done all that He can do and must rely on the passive virtue of patience. He accomplished as much, if not more, in His patience than He did in His activity. The Apostle John, thinking of Christ and His kingdom, said, "I John, your brother and partaker with you in the tribulation and kingdom and patience which are in Jesus..."

(Rev. 1: 9), mentions patience here as the trait He remembers of Jesus. Not only during the training of His disciples did patience, love, forgiveness and meekness accomplish great things for Jesus, but at the cross these virtues were the very undergirding of His soul for that supreme moment on the cross.

In a local church as people work out their own salvation they must ever remember the limited impressions made oftentimes by strenuous efforts. Railing at adversaries, blowing horns against evil, protesting loudly the immoralities, an active opposition arises. Men are known to resist these efforts to set the world aright, and then, finally, through patience, forgiveness, meekness, and love they

to Him who was the essence of patience and love. When nothing else can subdue an enemy, then try patience and love, and you will awake to find that power is not measured by exertion only.

Look at the Christian martyrs: By these passive virtues their blood became the seed of the kingdom, as one man expressed it. It was through faith and patience that they inherited the promises. See the mother in her love and patience winning back the wayward son when all the militant efforts have failed! "They also serve, who only stand and wait."

NOVEMBER 3, 1965 KEEPING THE WHOLE LAW

"For whosever shall keep the whole law, and yet offend in one point, he is guilty of all." (James 2: 10.)

We talk much about the future of the Lord-'s church. What will happen to it? Will it be -come stronger or weaker? The answer to all questions regarding the church are the same as the answers to questions in our own lives. The future will be determined by how much we respect the law of God. I am not nearly as much concerned about what future generations will do with the church as I am what kind of church we are giving to them with which to do something. Will it be necessary for them to waste time solving problems that we should have already solved? Will they be forced to do a work we should have already done? While we are worrying about the next generation hav -ing respect for the law of God, do we have respect for it ourselves? We often break one law while trying to keep another. Let us illustrate what I mean:

Some time ago I talked with a young man who was having difficulty in his home life. He told me about his wife calling him and ask -ing him to come where she was so they could talk about their difficulties. He was rather bragging when he said, "I took my life and the life of others in my own hands and drove ninety miles an hour to get there." Fortunate -ly he get by with it that time. But he felt justified in violating one law in order to obey another. Now look at this as it has to do with other matters.

Some people would not think of missing the opportunity to worship God, yet think nothing of filling their hearts with envy, jealousy and turning their tongues loose at both ends. While they would not hurt a person physically, they will cut and slice with their tongues as one would with a razor. Others would not think of committing what we call a "moral sin," and would severely condemn those who do, usually winding up their condemnation with a sentence beginning with, "Now I...." and feel

cousness, and other like sins. Some would not think of missing worship, and do not see how anyone could feel quiltless in so doing, but with no conscience at all they can associate with their friends and never mention the name of Christ. How severely we condemn others when we ourselves stand condemned! How easy it is to condemn the unbaptized while being covetous.

The answer to our problems -- all of our problems -- depends on our willingness to kee -p the whole law of God. We cannot speak the truth about God's word and lie about something else and be quiltless. We cannot insist on a "Thus saith the Lord" when it comes to spiritual matters and twist the truth into a falsehood about other matters. The strength of the church in the future, and the strength of the church today depends on how willing we are to obey God in all things. And this does not only have to do with what is preached in the pulpit but also on what is lived in the pew. The church will never be what it should be until we are cognizant of our first duty... .. "Seek ye first the kingdom of God"

"The practice of practical Christianity on every level from the individual to the international could turn this old world into a virtual paradise. Men could be taught to beat their swords into plowshares, and could be induced to spend their money for things other than blood and blasting powder. If there was ever an opportunity for all the faithful, consecrated, sacrificing Christians, it is now. The world is tired of advice - what it needs

is example."

"And we can well begin at home. The un-christian principles of hate, and jealousy, and flinty hard-hearted unconcern are all too pre -valent. They manifest themselves in vitriolic speech and writing. The ability to say a thing hard and nasty has never been the badge of a Christian. The very spirit shown by one who seems to receive sadistic pleasure out of the fact that he has found some brother or some church that he can castigate publicly de -monstrates itself to be of the devil rather than of God. The tendency to publish, or the tendency to enjoy juicy morsels of slander, or bits of information designed to arouse and foment ill will among brethren is diametrical -ly opposed to the nature and teachings of Jesus Christ."

"A constant diet of half truths, veiled threats, untrue claims, intimidating reports, unfair advantages taken, tale-bearing, delibe-rate mis-statements of facts, and love for pre-eminence and power, produced Nazism and Facism. These tactics will produce Nazism and

Facism in the church."

"The principles of brotherly love and forgiveness must constantly permeate a congregation, else it will sooner or later be destroy
-ed. These principles must permeate the broth
-erhood or else it will sooner or later be
destroyed. A house divided against itself can
-not stand. We must practice these principles
ourselves before we can have much chance of
